Towamencin Township's 2017 Updates

Energy and Environmental Upgrades and Improvements



▪ In July, the Township replaced 99 old mercury halide streetlights with energy efficient LED lamps through the Regional Street Lighting Procurement Program, involving 35 municipalities. This regional project upgrades more than 26,000 streetlights, exterior lights and traffic signals. The 35 municipalities will achieve annual reductions of 10.6 million kilowatt hours; 5,500 metric tons of carbon dioxide emissions; and \$1.4 million in annual energy and operating costs.

▪ The Township had an extensive energy assessment study completed of its municipal buildings, funded with grant monies. Opportunities to save energy and reduce operational utility costs were identified and a plan was implemented. The plan includes: lighting upgrades, window repairs, and the replacement of our aging electric / natural gas HVAC system to a geo-thermal system, which is currently underway.



▪ Pollutant Reduction Plans are a new requirement from the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection for 2018 National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System general permits. These plans show how a municipality will reduce the pollutant loads going into a waterway. To address these federally mandated storm water quality improvements in an efficient and cost effective manner, Towamencin has joined with several other municipalities and stakeholders to conduct modeling of waterways and possible site improvements that could be evaluated to address the sediment reduction requirements of the Skippack Creek.

Open Space, Trails, Infrastructure & Parks Plans and Upgrades

▪ Towamencin Township's "Open Space Preservation Plan" and "Master Trails Plan" both recommend the development of a trail extension along Towamencin Creek from the Trumbauer Road Bridge to Valley View Way. However, sufficient funding has not been available in previous years to complete this missing component of a larger trail. The Township was awarded a \$100,000 grant from Montgomery County towards establishing this trail. An application was submitted in September through the Pennsylvania

Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside Grant Program, to garner additional funds for construction.

▪ The Open Space and Parks Advisory Committee has been working on the following: analyzing plans for a future pedestrian trail bridge at Fischer's Park; examining concepts for bathroom facilities at various parks; and the placement of security / vandalism protection at parks and the pool.

▪ Since the end of April, the Township Public Works Department has

completed significant infrastructure projects including: the removal of over 984 feet of old dilapidated corrugated metal storm pipes and installed new PVC lines; replaced 18 storm water inlet boxes; prepared 2.5 miles of road for the annual road paving project; and completed 549 tons of blacktop patches.



▪ Work has begun on repairs to the Municipal Complex, including the replacement of the original red barn style wood shutters on the municipal complex building due to rotting and deterioration of materials.

▪ The Towamencin Municipal Authority replaced a section of an essential sanitary sewer interceptor off Kriebel Road. The project included: construction of approximately 6,500 feet of sanitary sewer main, 21 man-holes, wetland/waterway crossings and other related work.

▪ Our "Summer under the Stars" special events were expanded to include four live concerts and two movies at our award winning Fischer's Park.



Snow Plowing Preparation

The Township is urging residents to help prepare for the snow and its removal by shaking their mailbox. In most instances where mailboxes are damaged, the snow plow doesn't actually hit the mailbox, the force of snow thrown from the roadway is enough to knock down a loose mailbox. Damage to posts and receptacles can often be prevented by proper routine maintenance. Taking time to tighten screws and secure mail receptacles now can prevent serious headaches later. If the mailbox moves when shaken, the mailbox and/or post may not withstand standard snow removal operations and should be repaired or replaced prior to the onset of winter.

The Township has policies in place regarding replacement of mailboxes that are properly placed and have obviously been directly hit by a snowplow. However, the Township is not responsible for mailbox damage caused by snow being thrown off the plow, or if a mailbox is hanging over in to the cart way.

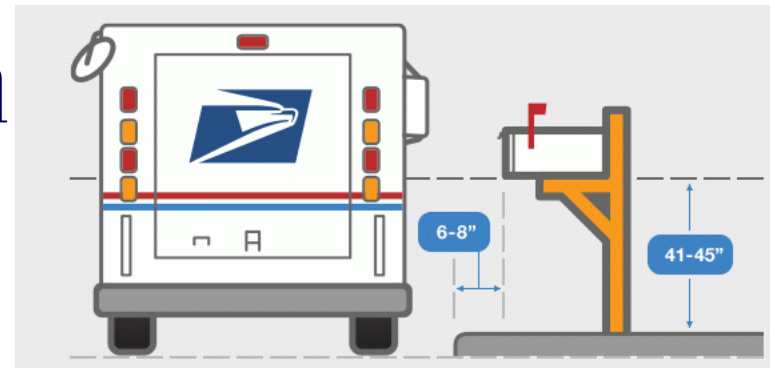
*According to the United States Postal Service, mailboxes are to be placed with the face of the box 6 to 8 inches from the front of the curb.

*Sidewalk Shoveling & Driveway Plowing – Township Code does not allow for snow to be plowed or blown back into the street. Ordinances prohibit this practice, which in extreme conditions can result in fines. The purpose of this ordinance is to keep our streets clear for safe travel. For residents who have a private contractor clear their driveways, please remind them of this provision.

*Plowing Operations - Public Works crews start preparing by applying a brine mix to the roads one to two days before a forecasted storm. When the snow starts to fall, crews are called in by the police so that salting can be conducted to help melt and limit the bond that the accumulating snow has on the roads. Salting all Township roads takes about four hours. Should the snow start to accumulate, plowing operations are initiated and continue until the storm has ended and roads are fully cleared. With severe storms, this could take up to 24 hours.

*Fire Hydrants - A fire hydrant can help save lives and property in your neighborhood. The Township and Fire Company request residents to assist the community in keeping fire hydrants, located in front their home, clear of snow.

*Trash Receptacles - Many residents have had their trash and recycling containers damaged or even lost during severe winter storms. When it snows, please place your receptacles at the end of your driveway, not in the street.



*Parking - When a "Snow Emergency" is declared by the Township, all cars must be removed from streets designated and posted as a "Snow Emergency Route." Vehicles not removed are subject to towing and citation. During any snow storm, even if a snow emergency is not declared, all residents are highly encouraged to remove all vehicles and seasonal equipment from the roadways by placing them in their driveways if possible. This will ensure streets are cleared and to allow plow drivers unobstructed ability to plow roadways.

*Child Safety - Children love to play in the snow, but this is potentially very dangerous because our plow operators cannot see the children. Visibility is difficult even in the best conditions, so we ask that you please keep children away from the roads during snow removal.

We are very aware of the frustration residents have when a plow truck comes by and deposits snow back into driveways, seemingly just after they have been cleared. We understand that this is not welcomed, particularly if your hired contractor has just completed your sidewalk and driveway. This is an unavoidable aspect of winter; we thank you in advance for your understanding.

Basketball Poles/Nets, etc. - Remove all items from the Township's right-of-way before winter arrives. Items like decorations, basketball nets or other portable objects are not permitted in the right-of-way at any time. A good rule of thumb is to keep such items 10 feet back from the roadway to reduce the damage from the plows.



As an unapproved structure within the legal right-of-way, the following applies:

The Township will not pay for any damage to basketball poles, nets or any other recreational equipment located within the public right-of-way that is damaged by plowed snow or struck during plowing operations.

The Township will seek full payment for any damage to salting/plowing equipment caused by recreational equipment located within the public right-of-way.

Towamencin Voter Information

- November 3 - Last day for County Boards of Elections to receive voted civilian absentee ballots
- **November 7 - MUNICIPAL ELECTION**
- November 8 - First day to REGISTER after November election
- November 14 - Last day for County Board of Elections to receive voted military and overseas absentee ballots (submitted for delivery no later than 11:59 P.M. on November 6)



Snow Removal Reminders



The Public Works road crews are responsible for maintaining 76 miles of Township roadway. The Township would like to remind all property owners that plowing of snow is an imperfect process and certain inconveniences are unavoidable.

The two most common complaints received by the Township are damage to mailboxes and plowing closed previously cleared driveways. There are no remedies to these problems. Township plows must operate at a rate of speed in order to create enough momentum to remove snow from the road. Therefore, windrows are unavoidable. Old, unsecured mailboxes are prone to damage because of the weight of the snow.

We ask for your understanding and your acceptance of these realities and suggest that, if possible, you delay shovelling your driveway until after the Township plows have completed snow removal. Township's snow removal operators work long hours during storms trying to do their best for the benefit of us all.

Towamencin's Cold Blue Plan

During this winter season, Montgomery County will again be implementing a winter weather, or "Code Blue" emergency plan. In periods of extreme, life-threatening weather, defined as a wind-chill factor of 20°F or below, multiple county agencies and private health / social organizations will offer expanded services for those without adequate shelter, including the chronically homeless and homeless families with children. The goal of the Code Blue plan is to provide temporary shelter, food, and clothing to those in need.

WHAT TO DO IN "CODE BLUE" CONDITIONS

- Check on elderly friends and neighbors frequently to ensure that their homes are adequately heated.
- If you see someone in need of immediate assistance, call or text 911.
- If you or someone you know needs temporary shelter from the cold weather, call Coordinated Homeless Outreach Center (CHOC) at 610-291-9244.
- Make sure your car is winterized with antifreeze, a full tank of gas, properly inflated tires, and is stocked with an emergency kit.
- Check your smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors.
- Wear appropriate clothing and avoid prolonged exposure when going outdoors in winter weather.
- Limit your pets' time outdoors during extreme temperatures.
- Report power outages directly to your utility company, **DO NOT** call 9-1-1.

Fall and Winter Season Preparations

Leaf and Yard Waste

Pennsylvania Law prohibits placing leaves in the trash. Leaves must be composted on site or placed out for separate collection. Your contracted waste hauler is responsible for providing this service to their customers in Towamencin Township.

- Residents must purchase their own biodegradable leaf and yard waste collection bags that are available at grocery and hardware stores; no plastic bags are permitted. No more than 10 bags per collection.

- Haulers are to advise customers of specific dates for leaf pick-up. Haulers are required to provide three collection dates for leaves and yard waste: first collection in late October, second collection in November and a third collection in May.

- Customers may be billed by their hauler for these DEP mandated collections.

- Haulers are required to report tonnage collected from each collection to Towamencin, so that it can be forwarded to DEP.

The Township has an active agreement in place with the Barnside Farm Compost Facility - undertaken by and in conjunction with the Northern Montgomery County Recycling Commission - should residents wish to drop off their yard-waste for a fee. There is a minimum charge for leaves of \$10 and the rate is \$24 per ton. Barnside will also accept brush for a minimum charge of \$20 and a rate of \$40 per ton. The Barnside Farm Compost Facility is located at 991 Haldeman Road, Schwenksville, PA 19473. Residents with specific questions may call the facility directly at (610) 287-8880.

Winter Storms

All property owners and/or tenants are responsible for removing snow and ice from the sidewalks within the public right-of-way for a clear path width of 28 inches. Snow and ice must be removed within 24 hours after the end of a storm.

Property owners and/or tenants are also responsible to clear hydrants within their property boundaries for a clearance of 3 feet around the hydrant. The minutes saved by not having to clear snow from a hydrant may mean a drastic difference in the outcome of firefighting efforts. The house you save may be your own.

Please park vehicles off the streets during a winter storm to allow for safe and efficient snow removal from curb to curb. Also remove trash cans and sports equipment from the roadway. To avoid being plowed in, shovel snow to the right of your driveway (as you are facing the road). It is unlawful to throw, shovel or plow snow into any roadways within the township from adjoining property.

It is unlawful to park any vehicles on a Snow Emergency Route during a declared Snow Emergency. Please consult the Public Works section of the Township website for a list of Snow Emergency Routes.

- ◆ When a fire truck, police vehicle or ambulance is passing or approaching you, make sure you give them the right of way.

- ◆ Pay attention to traffic.
- ◆ Have an adult screen all candy received in the Halloween candy bags.
- ◆ Report serious incidents promptly to the police.

Are you READY for a Hurricane? If not, use the American Red Cross website for information to be used in case of a Hurricane. Listen to WNPV, NOAA for weather updates. Make sure you have enough water for three days and emergency food. Keep an eye on the elderly.

Pennsylvania Turnpike Construction Update

Towamencin Township is happy to announce that the Pennsylvania Turnpike Widening Project has finally been completed in the Towamencin area and is proceeding north.

The Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission has deferred its evergreen sapling program until spring 2018. These fast-growing saplings are to help replace the trees that were removed as part of the Northeastern Extension Total Reconstruction and Widening Project, between Valley Forge Road and the Lansdale Interchange.

Ways to Stay Green When the Leaves are Changing

Ideas for an Environmentally Friendly Winter:

Harvest fallen leaves

There are many sources of storm water pollution unique to autumn, and we need your help to control them. The leaves are falling and their improper disposal poses a threat to our water resources. Leaf litter and any yard waste dumped into a storm water basin or near a waterway can cause harmful nutrient accumulation. Leaves swept into the street can easily enter storm drains and make their way into the nearest creek as well.

Dispose of leaf litter and yard waste in a compost pile, **never in the street or stream!** You can shred yard and leaf waste to use as mulch or fertilizer for your yard and garden.

Aerate and overseed your lawn

Aerating your lawn is an important, yet commonly overlooked, lawn maintenance task. Aeration involves perforating the soil with small holes to allow air, water and nutrients to penetrate the grass roots. This helps the roots grow deeply and produce a stronger, more vigorous lawn. It also reduces soil compaction and restores your lawn's natural draining ability resulting in less runoff to our streams.

The practice of overseeding lawns is really nothing more than

spreading grass seed over an existing lawn. Particular attention should be paid to bare areas. With fall germination, the young grass will have two or three months to become better established before temperatures drop too low and growth stops. Next spring, the young plants will have another few months to develop deeper roots before the summer heat sets in. A full, healthy lawn helps to prevent erosion and also reduces runoff.

A little extra caution while you keep up with your fall to-do list can make a big difference for the health of our environment, and we thank you for cooperating with this effort.

Towamencin Turkey Trot 5k Walk/Run

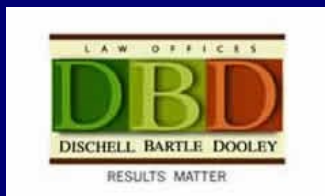

Follow these 4 Steps to Keep Kids Safe in the Car

- 1. Keep Children Rear-Facing as Long as Possible:**

 - Use rear-facing car seats in the back seat as long as possible up to the rear-facing weight or height limit (even up to age 2 or 3).
 - Use a car seat with higher weight and height limits if your child outgrows their car seat before age 2 to keep your child rear-facing longer.
 - Leg crowding is expected and does not cause harm as long as the child is within weight and height limits for the car seat.
- 2. Keep Children in Car Seats with Harnesses as Long as Possible:**

 - Use a forward-facing car seat with a harness and tether in the back seat when the upper rear-facing weight or height limit is reached.
 - Use the car seat with a harness as long as possible up to the upper weight or height limit for the harness.
- 3. Keep Children in Booster Seats until the Seat Belt Fits:**

 - Use booster seats in the back seat until the seat belt fits.
 - Use a seat belt when:
 - The child can sit all the way back in the vehicle seat with knees bent at the edge of the seat.
 - The shoulder belt crosses the center of the chest and rests on the shoulder (not the neck).
 - The lap belt fits low and snug on the hips / upper thighs (not the stomach).
- 4. Keep Children Belted in the Back Seat until Age 13:**

 - Use a correctly fitted lap and shoulder belt in the back seat for older children when they outgrow the booster seat, which may not happen until close to 12 years old.
 - The back seat is safest for all children.

KEEP YOUR LITTLE ONES SAFE WHILE DRIVING

Make sure your child safety seat is properly installed. The Towamencin Township Police Department has a certified child safety seat installer on staff. Township residents can make an appointment during normal business hours by contacting Kelly Palermo at police headquarters at 215-368-7606.

- ***Internal Revenue Tax Return** (tax return compromised)
- ***Bail or arrest money call/email** (caller states that \$\$ needed for release)

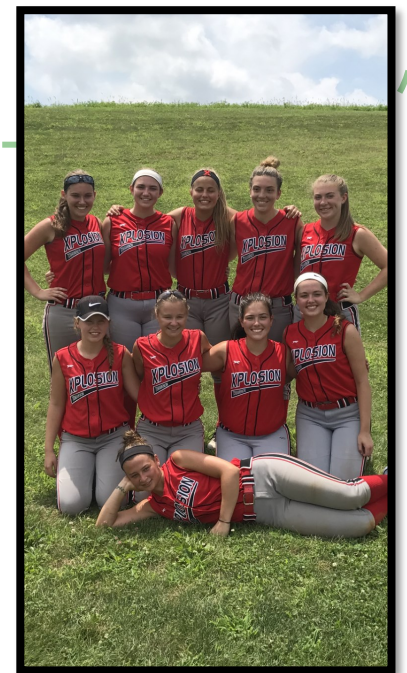

9U & 10UA — Placed 2nd in Districts, qualifying for States

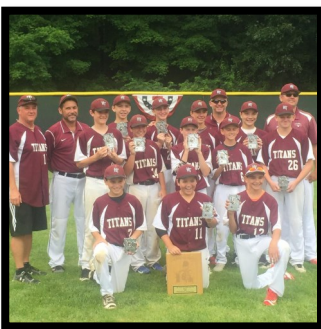
10UB — Out of 5 tournaments, advanced to 3 championship games and 2 semi-final games

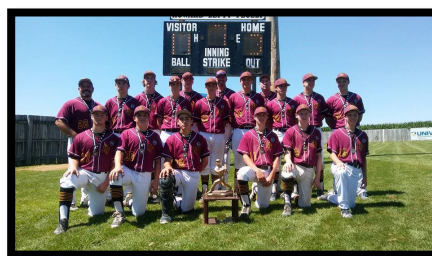
American Legion

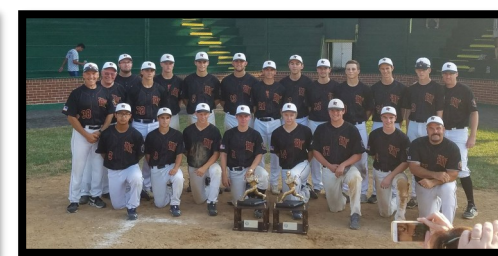
Fall 2017

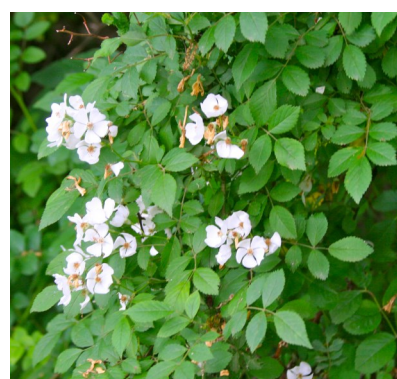
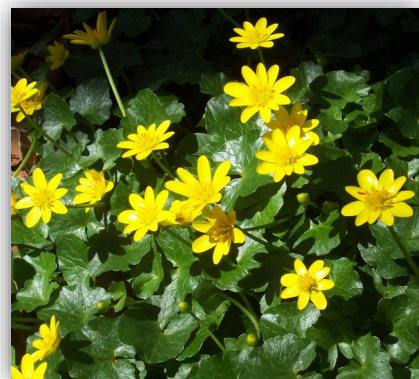

Invasive plants are those that are non-native to Pennsylvania, grow aggressively, and can crowd out existing native plants. The native ecosystem can become degraded for all of its inhabitants, from native plants to insects, birds and animals. Ultimately, invasive plants alter habitats and reduce biodiversity.

Message From the Codes Department: Open Burning



Open Burning Rules

Who Can Burn: ONE and TWO FAMILY RESIDENTIAL DWELLING UNITS ONLY

What You Can Burn: Yard trimmings ONLY

What You CANNOT Burn: LEAVES, Recycling Material, Garbage, Household, Business, Industrial Trash and Construction Debris or Similar Waste Products

Where You Can Burn: Not less than 50 feet from any structure, and so placed as to prevent the spread of fire to within 50 feet of any structure, vehicle or fuel tank and not less than 25 feet from any property line

Where You CANNOT Burn: In any street, alley or any right-of-way

When You Can Burn:

During the months of January, February, March, June, July, August, September and December - Saturdays and Sundays only

During the months of April, May, October and November - Daily

Additional Information

Prior to any burning, the resident shall be required to notify the Township Police Department at 215-368-7600.

*You MAY NOT start burning before 8:00am. The fire and all embers must be completely extinguished before dusk on the same day ignited. Smoldering debris IS NOT acceptable.

*The fire must be attended constantly by a responsible person.

*You must have an operating garden hose long enough to reach 15 feet beyond the burn pile.

*The pile size must not exceed 5' x 5' x 3' high.

If more piles exist, only one (1) pile may be burning at a time.

*You may not use flammable liquids to accelerate the burning of the pile.

*You may not burn during high winds, drought or weather inversions or when deemed hazardous by the Fire Marshall.

*The fire must be free burning and not generating excessive smoke.

*Any embers discharging from the fire must be controlled and may not enter onto adjacent properties.

*If a complaint is received due to excessive smoke or fire embers entering onto adjacent properties, the Fire Marshall's Office or the Police Department may order the fire to be extinguished.

*If high winds exist, a ban will be placed on any "open burning" for the remainder of the day.

*The fire must be completely extinguished by dusk on the same day it was ignited. No extension of this time may be granted.

Community Development Updates

* Towamencin Senior Living received approval to build a 144-bed senior living facility on Towamencin Avenue. Construction is expected to start in late fall.

* Summit Development Group has submitted a land development application for a 642,425 square-foot warehouse and office facility on Wambold Road. The property also extends along Allentown Road and Fretz Road. However, no development is proposed along the southern portion of the property at this time.

* Wambold Realty has submitted a land development application for a 52,200 square-foot public storage facility on Wambold Road.

* The Verrichia Group has submitted a sketch plan to develop the property at Forty Foot Road and Sumneytown Pike in the location of the existing Wawa store and Lukoil gas station as a new Wawa store with gas.

* Further planning for the redevelopment of Towamencin Village

Shopping Center at Forty Foot Road and Allentown Road is being deferred, awaiting possible removal of the Forty Foot Road "pinch point" at Tomlinson/Heebner Roads.

* Developers are working on building and grading permits for the Royal Farms convenience store approved by the Township, near the Turnpike interchange. Construction is expected to start in late fall.

* Blueprint Brewing is seeking a zoning text amendment and conditional use approval for a brewery with accessory sales. The brewery use is permitted by-right and Blueprint has already received building permits to begin construction of the brewing operation. However, allowing accessory sales to be permitted on-site requires additional zoning amendments and approvals.
