Wounded Warrior Softball Team Coming to Towamencin

The Griffin Gives Foundation is honored to welcome the nationally recognized Wounded Warrior Amputee Softball Team back to the Indian Valley on Saturday October 1, 2016. This event will be held at Butch Clemens Park, located at 130 Forty Foot Road, Lansdale, PA in Towamencin Township. This event will bring together local softball teams, comprised of first responders, to play a round-robin style tournament against each other and against the Wounded Warriors. In 2014, the WWAST swept its' opponents before settling in for an evening filled with dinner, dancing and several special recognitions.

The First Responder games will begin at 8:00 a.m., Telford and Souderton Fire Companies vs. Hatfield and Towamencin Fire Companies, followed by Montgomery County Police vs. local Veterans. The Wounded Warrior Amputee Softball Team is

scheduled to arrive under police escort, in parade like fashion, during a special ceremony scheduled for 11:00 a.m. A postgame dinner reception will follow the day's events at the Courtyard Marriott Lansdale, 1737 Sumneytown Pike, Lansdale, PA, beginning at 7 p.m. Dinner will feature a Meet and Greet with the Wounded Warrior Amputee Softball Team, buffet dinner, cash bar, raffles and silent auctions.

The mission of the Wounded Warrior Amputee Softball Team (WWAST) is to raise awareness of the sacrifices and resilience of our military and highlight their ability to rise above any challenge, through exhibition and celebrity softball games. Their goal is to show other amputees and the general population that these athletes through extensive rehabilitation and training are able to express their desires and perform the sport they loved.

The WWAST is comprised of young, competitive, athletic veterans and active duty soldiers, who have lost limbs post-9/11 while serving their country in the military/war. The team includes individuals with a variety of amputations: of the arm, above knee, below knee, bilateral below knee and foot. Some team members are still in the service. Others are attending college, thanks to the post-9/11 GI Bill, while others have moved on to new careers.

Towamencin Land Converting to Naturalized Area

As a result of recent Federal EPA laws and Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection regulations related to the Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System ("MS4") Program, Towamencin Township established a pilot program this year to evaluate the benefits of allowing some passive open space areas to transition to naturalized meadows.


The MS4 Program is the result of 1987 amendments to the Clean Water Act, whereby Congress mandated that the Environmental Protection Agency address Non-Point Source ("NPS") pollution in stormwater runoff. NPS pollution, unlike pollution from industrial and sewage treatment plants, comes from many sources. It is caused by rainfall or snowmelt moving over and through the ground. As the runoff moves, it picks up and carries away natural and human-made pollutants, finally depositing them into lakes, rivers, wetlands, coastal waters and even our underground sources of drinking water. In Pennsylvania, the MS4 Program is administered by the Department of Environmental Protection. As part of the MS4 Program, Towamencin Township holds a permit to discharge stormwater into local waterways. This permit requires the Township to design a stormwater management program that reduces the discharge of pollutants to the maximum extent possible.

The Township currently owns and maintains several areas of open space. The Township Environmental Advisory Council has researched the benefits of allowing some of these areas to return

to a natural state for both environmental reasons, as well as, to satisfy the mandates directed by DEP. This involves allowing the areas to grow out, transforming a conventional mowed lawn into a natural ecosystem capable of providing habitat, improving the water quality and providing aesthetic value.

Based on the Council's recommendations, the Board of Supervisors directed the establishment of a pilot program this year to evaluate benefits and impacts.

Towamencin Township does its part to comply with Federal EPA laws, Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection regulations and overall efforts to help the environment.

Community Development Updates

Towamencin Senior Living: A land development application has been submitted for a 3-story, 41,853 sqft, assisted living facility with 88 suites and 25 memory care units to be located on Towamencin Avenue. The applicant appeared at the July Planning Commission meeting and intends to make modifications based on comments received and will return to the Planning Commission this fall.

Royal Farms: The applicant has submitted plans for a proposed convenience store with gasoline sales on Sumneytown Pike, near the exit to the Pennsylvania Turnpike. The new development would include the demolition of the existing Gulf gas station and the adjacent 3-story white stucco building.



Grand View Hospital: The hospital will be opening an urgent care facility this fall at the old Univest Building, located at the corner of Forty Foot Road and Sumneytown Pike.

Entertainment Overlay District: In July, the Board of Supervisors approved a zoning map and text amendment to create a new Overlay District that includes: approximately 52 acres bounded by Allentown Road to the north, Forty Foot Road to the east, Tomlinson Road to the south and the R-175 Residential District to the west. The current zoning, which would remain as underlying, is Shopping Center, Commercial and Limited Industrial. The purpose of the Entertainment Lifestyle Overlay District is to provide for the consolidation and redevelopment of large commercial properties with adjacent non-residentially zoned properties to accommodate a redevelopment in the current commercial market and to allow and control a variety of uses.

Sign Ordinance Amendments: The Township Planning Commission has conducted a comprehensive review and update of the sign ordinance over the past two years. The ordinance will be finalized and presented to the Board of Supervisors this fall.

Fall and Winter Season Preparations

Leaf and Yard Waste

Pennsylvania Law prohibits placing leaves in the trash. Leaves must be composted on site or placed out for separate collection. Your contracted waste hauler is responsible for providing this service to their customers in Towamencin Township.

- Residents must purchase their own biodegradable leaf and yard waste collection bags that are available at grocery and hardware stores; no plastic bags are permitted. No more than 10 bags per collection.

- Haulers are to advise customers of specific dates for leaf pick-up. Haulers are required to provide three collection dates for leaves and yard waste: first collection in late October, second collection in November and a third collection in May.
- Customers may be billed by their hauler for this DEP mandated collection.
- Haulers are required to report tonnage collected from each collection to Towamencin, so that it can be forwarded to DEP.

The Township has an active agreement in place

with the Barnside Farm Compost Facility undertaken by and in conjunction with the Northern Montgomery County Recycling Commission - should residents wish to drop off their yard-waste for a fee. There is a minimum charge for leaves of \$10 and the rate is \$24 per ton. Barnside will also accept brush for a minimum charge of \$20 and a rate of \$40 per ton. The Barnside Farm Compost Facility is located at 991 Haldeman Road, Schwenksville, PA 19473. Residents with specific questions may call the facility directly at (610) 287-8880.

Winter Storms

All property owners and/or tenants are responsible for removing snow and ice from the sidewalks within the public right-of-way for a clear path width of 28 inches. Snow and ice must be removed within 24 hours after the end of a storm.

Property owners and/or tenants are also responsible to clear hydrants within their property boundaries for a clearance of 3 feet around the hydrant. The minutes saved by not having to clear snow from a hydrant may mean a drastic difference in the outcome of firefighting efforts. The house you save may be your own.

Please park vehicles off the streets during a winter storm to allow for safe and efficient snow removal from curb to curb. Also remove trash cans and sports equipment from the roadway. To avoid being plowed in, shovel snow to the right of your driveway (as you are facing the road). It is unlawful to throw, shovel or plow snow into any roadways within the township from adjoining property.

It is unlawful to park any vehicles on a Snow Emergency Route during a declared Snow Emergency. Please consult the Public Works section of the Township website for a list of Snow Emergency Routes.

- If going out for a walk, jog, or run through your neighborhood/development add a reflective vest to your running attire. Be seen, be observant and be ready to act.
- Walk, run, jog toward on-coming traffic. Be observant of the direction of travel by adjacent traffic. If you are going walking or running, walk/run in the direction toward traffic, wear approved reflective gear and carry a flashlight.
- Do not shine your flashlight into the eyes of oncoming drivers.
- Cyclists must follow the rules of the road. Bicyclists must stop for stop signs and traffic lights.
- When a fire truck, police vehicle or ambulance is passing or approaching you, make sure you give them the right of way.

- Make your child, or yourself very visible.
- Pay attention to traffic.
- Have an adult screen all candy received in the Halloween candy
- Report serious incidents promptly to the police.

Pennsylvania Turnpike Construction Update



The Pennsylvania Turnpike's reconstruction and widening project is focused on expanding the roadway from two lanes to three lanes in both the northbound and southbound directions between mileposts A26 and A31.

When completed, this section will have wider

travel lanes, wider shoulders, and an expanded median.

The traffic switch to the new lanes (future right lane and shoulder) has been completed in the areas north of the Lansdale Interchange and south of South Valley Forge Road. The remaining road work in the center of the project will be accomplished in stages. Weather permitting, the traffic switch onto the new northbound lanes is expected in early November

and the switch onto the new southbound lanes is expected in mid-to-late November.

The auxiliary ramps at the Lansdale Interchange will follow the same schedule as the traffic switches, since the paving in the center of the project must be completed before the auxiliary ramps can tie into the Northeastern Extension. The E-ZPass-only northbound exit ramp is expected to open in early November; while the E-ZPass-only ramp accessing the southbound lanes is expected to be completed in mid-to-late November.

Sound wall installation, bridge work, excavation, retaining walls, and drainage tasks will be on-going throughout the remainder of the project, as construction continues to progress towards the overall contract completion date of June 2017. The contractor has the option to prioritize the means and methods necessary to meet the target completion date.

Ways to Stay Green When the Leaves are Changing

Ideas for an Environmentally Friendly Winter:

Harvest fallen leaves

There are many sources of storm water pollution unique to autumn, and we need your help to control them. The leaves are falling, and their improper disposal poses a threat to our water resources. Leaf litter and any yard waste dumped into a storm water basin or near a waterway can cause harmful nutrient accumulation. Leaves swept into the street can easily enter storm drains and make their way into the nearest creek as well.

Dispose of leaf litter and yard waste in a compost pile, **never in the street or stream!** You can shred yard and leaf waste to use as mulch or fertilizer for your yard and garden.

Aerate and overseed your lawn

Aerating your lawn is an important, yet commonly overlooked, lawn maintenance task. Aeration involves perforating the soil with small holes to allow air, water and nutrients to penetrate the grass roots. This helps the roots grow deeply and produce a stronger, more vigorous lawn. It also reduces soil compaction and restores your lawns natural draining ability resulting in less runoff to our streams.

The practice of overseeding lawns is really nothing more than spreading grass seed over an existing lawn. Particular attention should be paid to bare areas. With fall germination, the young grass will have two or three months to become better established before temperatures drop too low and growth stops. Next spring, the young plants will have another few months to develop deeper roots before the summer heat sets in. A full, healthy lawn helps to prevent erosion and also reduces runoff.

A little extra caution while you keep up with your fall to-do list can make a big difference for the health of our environment, and we thank you for cooperating with this effort.

Officers Receive District Attorney Commendations

Towamencin Township Police Officers James Hanrahan and Michael Seider were awarded a District Attorney's Commendation on May 12, 2016 at the Montgomery County Courthouse. On July 23, 2015, a male in Lansdale Borough took his parents hostage and threatened to harm them, as well as, any police officer that arrived at the scene. The male had seven firearms, including an AR-15 assault rifle and more than 2000 rounds of ammunition. Officers Hanrahan and Seider, along with Upper Gwynedd Township Sergeant Stephen Gillen, responded to assist Lansdale Borough Police Sergeant Dean Miller and Officer Joel Greco. The officers were able to lure the male outside. According to District Attorney Steele, due to their careful and measured approach to this volatile situation, the victims were rescued, the defendant was taken into custody and not a single shot was fired. The male was arrested and found guilty of 16 offenses, including aggravated assault and terroristic threats.

Highway Safety Efforts

Members of the Towamencin Township Police Highway Safety Unit work with the Bucks-Montgomery County Motor Carrier Enforcement Team on a regular basis to identify hazardous large trucks on our highways and truck drivers, who are impaired or not properly licensed. Specially trained officers, from various area police agencies, work together to set up inspection points and enforce Pennsylvania and Federal Motor Carrier Laws. Trucks that are found to be in an unsafe condition are taken off the road until corrections are made. With several major routes traversing the Township, including a Pennsylvania Turnpike Interchange, there are a large number of trucks travelling through the Township. While the trucking industry serves us all in a very positive way, it is important for them to be in a safe condition and operated in a lawful manner. The efforts of our police officers enhances the safety of everyone on our highways and protects our roadways from damage due to overweight vehicles.

Towamencin Youth Association Soccer Preview



The Towamencin Soccer Club (TSC) hit an all-time high in registration numbers with 903 players signing up for its three major leagues --Intramural, RecSelect and Travel programs. This represents a 10 percent increase in membership from last year, on top of a 10 percent increase from the preceding year.

TYA Caps Off Successful 2016 Baseball Season




Summer Connie Mack

Open Space & Parks Advisory Committee Update

The Open Space & Parks Advisory Committee is a volunteer group appointed by the Board of Supervisors to review and work on open space issues and provide direction on park maintenance and development. They meet on a monthly basis to discuss these issues.

The Committee has been quite busy this year. Projects have included the following:

- Coordinated improvements to the "Rain Garden" at Fischer's Park to allow for better drainage. Improvements will be completed this fall.
- Selected "Meadow View" as the name for the new pavilion at Fischer's Park.
- Arranged for the engagement of a "goose control" service to keep large flocks of Canadian Geese from gathering at various Township parks and properties, specifically Grist Mill Park,

Fischer's Park and the Township Municipal Complex.

Worked with local contractor, Allan Myers, who contributed manpower and equipment for grading work for a new softball field within the Township.

- Received a \$100,000 grant from Montgomery County to be used towards the construction of the Kriebel Road Connector Trail.
- Reviewed and consulted with Towamencin Youth Association on upgrades and usage of recreational spaces in the Township.

Environmental Council Focuses on Sustainability

The Towamencin Environmental Advisory Council (EAC) is pleased to announce the start of a Sustainability Program in the Township! "Sustainability is the ability to create and maintain the conditions under which humans and nature can exist in productive harmony to support present and future generations. Everything we need for our survival and well-being depends, either directly or indirectly on our natural environment" (Environmental Protection Agency). Through this program, the EAC will promote sustainability within our Township.

Check out Towamencin Township on Facebook for monthly sustainability tips, information, and facts! Here are a couple of posts you may have missed:

Did you know that the Fischer's Park parking lot was designed with sustainability in mind? This "green" parking lot was constructed with porous asphalt so that storm water will flow through the asphalt (rather than across the parking lot leading to erosion and sedimentation) into bioswales, where the storm water is infiltrated into the ground. In addition to

reducing storm water runoff, the porous asphalt filters pollutants from the water.

Naturalization is a process where a disturbed site is allowed to return to a natural state, which protects plants and wildlife, improves water quality, and increases biodiversity. Towamencin Township has eliminated mowing at nine open space areas, including the Municipal Complex. What can you do to create a naturalized lawn?

Below are some tips:

- Create a naturalized meadow on a portion of your property (contact a local landscape professional for recommendations).
- Add a water feature, such as a small pond.
- Create shelter for wildlife, such as a brush or rock pile, in an area away from regular use.
- Add native plants (contact a local landscape professional for recommendations).

Message From the Codes Department: Open Burning



Open Burning Rules

Who Can Burn: ONE and TWO FAMILY RESIDENTIAL DWELLING UNITS ONLY.

What You Can Burn: Yard trimmings ONLY.

What You CANNOT Burn: LEAVES, Recycling Material, Garbage, Household, Business, Industrial Trash and Construction Debris or Similar Waste Products.

Where You Can Burn: Not less than 50 feet from any structure, and so placed as to prevent the spread of fire to within 50 feet of any structure, vehicle or fuel tank and not less than 25 feet from any property line.

Where You CANNOT Burn: In any • Street, Alley or any Right of Way

When You Can Burn: Saturdays and Sundays Only during the months of January, February, March, June, July, August, September and December; Daily during the months of April, May, October and November.

Additional Information

- Prior to any burning, the resident shall be required to notify the Township Police Department at 215-368-7600.
- You MAY NOT start burning before 8:00

 a.m. The fire and all embers must be completely extinguished before dusk on the same day ignited. Smoldering debris IS NOT acceptable.
- The fire must be attended constantly by a responsible person.
- You must have an operating garden hose long enough to reach 15 feet beyond the burn pile.

- The pile size must not exceed 5' x 5' x 3' high. If more piles exist, only one (1) pile may burn at a time.
- You may not use flammable liquids to accelerate the burning of the pile.
- You may not burn during high winds, drought or weather inversions or when deemed hazardous by the Fire Marshall.
- The fire must be free burning and not generating excessive smoke.
- Any embers discharging from the fire must be controlled and may not enter onto adjacent properties.
- If a complaint is received due to excessive smoke or fire embers entering onto adjacent properties, the Fire Marshall's Office or the Police Department may order the fire to be extinguished.
- The fire must be completely extinguished by dusk on the same day it was ignited. No extension of this time may be granted.
