- Montgomery Community College held a ribbon cutting ceremony at their Culinary Art Institute on Forty Foot Road. State, County, and Local dignitaries were in attendance. They opened to their first class the Wednesday following the Ribbon Cutting. Look for events at the Institute.
- Chick Fil A has applied for permits and will soon be constructing their facility on Forty Foot Road next to the Wawa.
- North Penn School District, Christopher Dock High School, and other schools have reopened for the 2013 – 2014 School Year. The school zone lights are operating again and all drivers are cautioned to watch for and obey the flashing school zone lights. The speed limit in those zones is 15 MPH. Please slow down around the schools.
- The Township will begin Budget Meetings soon. The date and time of the meetings are on the Township Website.
- With Fall comes the leaves dropping from the trees. There are a few facts you should be aware of in conjunction with cleaning up the leaves.
 - Homeowners should not blow leaves into the street or into the stormwater system.
 - → Your trash hauler should provide you with a schedule for pick-up of leaves, and they will need to be in bags identified for that purpose.
- As we get into the Winter months, be mindful of Snow Emergency Routes, clearing your sidewalks, not plowing snow from your driveway into the street, and removing basketball nets, soccer nets and other items from the street when Snow Emergencies are declared. Slow down as conditions deteriorate. Watch out for others.
- And last, but not least, William "Bill" Webb has joined the Township Staff as Community Development and Enforcement Director.





Emergency Management

Who can forget Super Storm Sandy last year? Were you ready? Hurricane season will be with us through November this year, so let's look at some planning steps you should take, just in case.

- You should have a family plan for evacuation of your house, if necessary. Review it with your family. Make sure everyone knows what to do in an emergency, and if they have a role, what that role is.
- Does everyone know where to gather should you need to evacuate your house? Make sure everyone knows, and if you evacuate, everyone who was in the house is accounted for.
- If you have to evacuate to a relative's residence due to an extended loss of power and heat, make sure you take your medicines with you.
- If you are using an emergency generator, make sure it is not near the house where exhaust can be drawn into your home. Store gasoline for the generator in a shed in authorized containers.
- If you have lost power, notify your power company. Don't assume that because everyone else around you has lost power that the utility company knows.
- Don't touch or move downed power lines. Leave that for the professionals.
- Don't forget your pets and/or livestock.
- If you have an infant or toddler, don't forget the baby food, formula, diapers, toys and games.
- If you have an elderly neighbor, look in on them occasionally to ensure they are keeping warm and are secure.



There is a lot more that cannot be covered in this newsletter item. We have copies of the "**Pennsylvania Emergency Preparedness Guide**" at the Township Building. Stop in and ask for one and review it with your family. The time spent may come in handy when least expected.

From the Desk of Bill Webb, Director of Community Development and Codes

Greetings Towamencin Township Residents. I wanted to take this opportunity to introduce myself. I am the new Director of Community Development and Codes. I have worked in the codes industry since 2001 and take pride in what I do. I have my BA from West Chester University and also serve as a township supervisor at West Brandywine Township in Chester County. I have always been a community service oriented individual and feel that you as a resident are the reason I am here to begin with. Now on to the codes stuff.

We strive to provide superior customer service within the codes department but sometimes need your help to do so. Please keep in mind when applying for permits our applications list specifically what is required to be returned with the application. If you fail to provide all the information, it will delay your application being approved in-turn delaying your project.

With the change of seasons fast approaching, we must remind you that **it is your responsibility** to keep all **public and private sidewalks** clear of leaves and snow. This rule also applies if you have a fire hydrant located on your property. You will be required to clear these areas within 24 hours of the cessation of a snow or freezing rain event. The fine for non-compliance can be as high as \$1000.

On a final note, please remember to change the batteries in your smoke detectors. Furthermore, did you know the state recommends a smoke detector on each floor and in every bedroom? A smoke detector can save your life so please put them in.



SCOOP THE POOP Dogs for the Environment

Why? Pet Waste is more than smelly and unsightly. It is a health risk to pets, creeks, lakes and people, especially children. Pet waste left on trails, sidewalks, streets, and grassy areas are immediately flushed into the nearest waterway when it rains. Like human waste, animal waste may contain harmful bacteria and viruses, making the water unfit for irrigation, recreation or other uses. These bacteria and viruses can pose health risks to humans, such as Campylobacteriosis and Salmonellosis. In addition, pet waste contains nutrients that will speed up the growth of nuisance algae in lakes and rivers.

Be Prepared for An Emergency

The likelihood that you and your family will survive a house fire depends on having a working smoke detector and an exit strategy. The same is true for surviving other emergencies. Plan on having the tools and plans in place if disaster should strike.

Get a Kit of Emergency Supplies:

- Water, one gallon per person per day
- Food, at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
- Battery-powered radio and extra batteries
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- First aid kit
- Whistle to signal for help
- Filter mask or cotton t-shirt to filter air
- Moist towelettes for sanitation
- · Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Manual can opener
- · Plastic sheeting and duct tape
- Garbage bags and plastic ties
- Unique family needs, such as daily prescription medications, infant formula, important family documents

New "Rain Garden"

Among the recently installed improvements at Fischer's Park is a "Rain Garden." While under construction many park visitors questioned why the Township was putting a muddy pond in our beautiful park.

A rain garden is a shallow, constructed depression that is planted with deep-rooted native plants & grasses. It receives runoff from hard surfaces such as a roof, a sidewalk and a driveway. Rain gardens slow down the rush of water from these hard surfaces, holds the water for a short period of time and allows it to naturally infiltrate into the ground.

A rain garden can be thought of as a water quality system because it filters the runoff from roofs, parking areas, and lawns and recharges the groundwater.

Rain gardens are a beautiful and colorful way for homeowners, businesses and municipalities to help ease storm water problems. There is a growing trend by municipalities and homeowners to incorporate natural processes to help relieve flooding and pollution.

Why does that matter?

It's all about runoff. As our region's forests, farmland and other green spaces are paved over for highways, housing developments and shopping centers, the amount of impervious surface continues to grow. All this paves over the ground's natural ability to absorb rainwater. The result is a wastewater treatment nightmare as the cost of improving local water quality to meet EPA standards will run in the billions of dollars--thousands of dollars per homeowner. Add to that the financial, environmental and health impacts of flash flooding along our rivers and streams, and you begin to see the breadth of the dangers that unmanaged storm water pose to our communities.

The bottom line: Rain gardens are a simple way to make a difference.

We can turn things around - One rain garden at a time.

Bocce Ball comes to Towamencin Township

Two Bocce Courts were recently installed at Fischer's Park and used for the first time on Towamencin Day in September.

The earliest direct forerunner of modern bocce was reportedly played in the Italian Alps some two thousand years ago. Popular among Roman soldiers, it was introduced and popularized in regions assimilated into the Roman Empire. The name bocce, in fact, comes from the Latin "bottia", or ball.

The New World first learned of bocce thanks to immigrants from the British Isles, who brought their version, "bowls", with them when they arrived in America.


Even George Washington kept a bowls court at Mount Vernon in the late 1700s.

The equipment needed for a game of bocce are few and inexpensive: eight bocce balls -- four each of two colors - and a smaller target ball, or pallino. The larger balls come in a variety of sizes and colors, depending on the preference of the players.

Bocce is played with two teams, each of which can have one, two or four players. If the team has a single player, he throws four balls; two players, two balls; and four players, one ball. Each team tries to get its bocce closer to the pallino than those of its opponents.






