Big Changes & Improvement Projects for 2021

It has been another busy year in Towamencin with the hiring of a new Township Manager, continued work on many Township projects, and an increase in development activity. On June 24, after an extensive recruitment and interview process, we appointed Donald D. Delamater as Township Manager. Don has 25 years of municipal management experience, recently serving as Township Manager in Lower Providence Township. He previously served as Township Manager in Hilltown Township and in East Norriton Township, where he spent 7 years in the position after serving 13 years as Assistant Township Manager. He holds a master's degree in public administration from Villanova University and completed undergraduate studies in business administration at Florida Atlantic University. Don, his wife Holly, and three children CJ, Ryan and Dana are residents of Towamencin Township. His first day was August 9th. Our efforts to alleviate traffic conges-

Our efforts to alleviate traffic conge tion continue.

• In May, the most recent Forty Foot Road widening project was completed and opened for traffic. The roadway now has a consistent 5-lane configuration from Sumneytown Pike to Welsh Road. The project includes a traffic signal at Newbury Way and the future entrance/exit for the Towamencin Village Shopping Center.

• This fall, bids will be sought for traffic signal improvements at numerous intersections throughout the Township, funded primarily through a \$341,000 Green-Light-Go Grant from PennDOT and a \$42,700 grant from Montgomery County.



New Township Manager,

• The Township recently partnered with Hatfield Township in the preparation of an application for a DCED/CFA Multimodal Transportation Fund Grant in the amount of \$500,000 to \$600,000 for preliminary and final design improvements to the shared intersection at Welsh Road and Orvilla Road.

Don Delamater Work continues on the KRI I and KRI II trails.

PennDOT recently awarded the construction bid for the KRI I trail, which runs from Valley View Way to Trumbauer Road, and is primarily funded from a \$846,000 federal Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside Grant. Design work continues on the KRI II trail, which will connect an existing trail on Kriebel Road to Fischer's Park.

A \$50,000 proposal from the Township's planning consultant was recently approved for the preparation of a master plan for Veterans Memorial Park, located next to the Tennis-Lukens Cemetery on Allentown Road. State grants in the amount of \$25,000 from DCNR and \$25,000 from DCED were received towards the plan development.

In terms of land development, the Towamencin Village Shopping Center has had some revitalization activity with the opening of Planet Fitness in June. The center's developer, Philadelphia Suburban Development Corporation, has submitted plans for a Chipotle restaurant and a Mattress Factory store. They have also obtained permits for the demolition and rebuilding of the building facades. In other development news, Starbucks recently opened at the corner of Sumneytown Pike and Towamencin Avenue. Two previously approved plans, a 102,720 sq. ft. indoor storage facility on Franklin Street and a 591,360 sq. ft. warehouse facility on Wambold Road, near Allentown Road, are now under construction. Plan approval was recently granted for a 16 townhome development on Welsh Road and an application has been submitted for a 267,648 sq. ft. warehouse at the end of Delp Drive.

The Board of Supervisors thanks our first responders and public works crew for their many outstanding efforts in managing the remnants of Hurricane Ida. As always, they came through for Township residents.

Finally, a reminder that a fall concert and movie, the Turkey Trot 5K, and the Holiday Lights Festival/Tree Lighting will be held later this year.

A Touching Butterfly Garden Memorial at Fischer's Park

In August 2020, community volunteers came out in full force, not only during the search for, but with the planning of a vigil associated with the tragic loss of five-year old Eliza Talal on August 4, 2020. Eliza went missing during the height of Tropical Storm Isaias, which caused significant flooding to many parts of Towamencin and Montgomery County. Eliza was discovered in Fischer's Park on August 5, 2020.

A highly organized vigil was planned by community volunteers at Fischer's Park. However, their work was not finished. The volunteers wanted to do more for the family in the form of a memorial, but thought the usual offerings at the park, memorial trees/ benches, may not meet the moment or truly encapsulate the spirit of the young girl who captured the community's hearts.

A butterfly garden resonated with the volunteers, and a leader for the venture was needed. Enter Kelly Bertolazzi and her son, Andrew, who were inspired to lead the planning - acquiring the necessary Township reviews, approvals, and direction to advance the project. Their plans not only included a garden, but extensive hardscaping, comprised of a paver-pathway to a garden wall that incorporates a half-moon style communal sitting area in front of the butterfly garden.

The execution of the Bertolazzis' planning and project management, with the assistance of local landscaper Lee Terry, was unveiled this past August in conjunction with the anniversary of Eliza's passing. The memorial is located along the trail not far from the Meadow View Pavilion. It is a peaceful spot to rest and reflect, or catch up with a friend.

Ms. Bertolazzi noted how grateful the Talal family was by the gesture and how they will forever feel connected to the Towamencin Community. The memorial is an



inspiring symbol of the community's interconnectedness as so many came together during this tragic time.



Codes Department's Fall/Winter Reminders

Open Burning Rules

Who Can Burn: One and Two Family Residential Dwelling Units Only

What You Can Burn: Yard trimmings only

What You Cannot Burn: Leaves, Recycling Material, Garbage, Household, Business, Industrial Trash and Construction Debris or Similar Waste Products

Where You Can Burn: Not less than 50 feet from any structure, and so placed as to prevent the spread of fire to within 50 feet of any structure, vehicle or fuel tank and not less than 25 feet from any property line

Where You Cannot Burn: In any street, alley or any right-of-way

When You Can Burn: January, February, March, June, July, August, September and December - Saturdays and Sundays only

April, May, October and November - daily

Additional Information

Prior to any burning, residents are required to notify the Township Police Department at 215-368-7600.

You may not start burning before 8 am. The fire and all embers must be completely extinguished before dusk, on the same day ignited. Smoldering debris is not acceptable. The fire must be attended constantly by a responsible person.

You must have an operating garden hose long enough to reach 15 feet beyond the burn pile.

The pile size must not exceed 5' x 5' x 3' high. If multiple piles are necessary, only one (1) pile may be burning at a time.

You may not use flammable liquids to accelerate the burning of the pile.

You may not burn during high winds, drought or weather inversions or when deemed hazardous by the Fire Marshall.

The fire must be free burning and not generate excessive smoke.

Any embers discharged from the fire must be controlled and may not enter onto adjacent properties.

If a complaint is received due to excessive smoke or fire embers entering onto adjacent properties, the Fire Marshall's Office or the Police Department may order the fire to be extinguished.

If high winds exist, a ban will be placed on any "open burning" for the remainder of the day.

The fire must be completely extinguished by dusk on the same day it was ignited. No extension of this time may be granted.

Leaf and Yard Waste

Pennsylvania Law prohibits placing leaves in the trash. Leaves must be composted on site or placed out for separate collection. Your contracted waste hauler is responsible for providing this service to customers in Towamencin Township.

Residents must purchase their own biodegradable leaf and yard waste col-


lection bags that are available at grocery and hardware stores; no plastic bags are permitted. No more than 10 bags per collection.

Haulers are to advise customers of specific dates for leaf pick-up. Haulers are required to provide three collection dates for leaves and yard waste: a first collection in late October, a second collection in November, and a third collection in May. Customers may be billed by their hauler for this DEP mandated collection. Haulers are required to report tonnage collected from each collection to Towamencin so that it can be forwarded to DEP.

The Township has an active agreement in place with the Barnside Farm Compost Facility - in conjunction with the Northern Montgomery County Recycling Commission - should residents wish to drop off their yard-waste for a fee. There is a minimum charge of \$20 and a rate of \$40 per ton. The Barnside Farm Compost Facility is located at 991 Haldeman Road, Schwenksville, PA 19473. Residents with specific questions should call the facility at (610) 287-8880.

Winter Storm/Snow Reminders

All property owners and/or tenants are responsible for removing snow and ice from the sidewalks within the public right-of-way, making a clear path of 28 inches. Snow and ice must be removed within 24 hours after the end of a storm.



Property owners and/or tenants are

also responsible to clear hydrants within their property boundaries for a clearance of three feet around the hydrant. The minutes saved by not having to clear snow from a hydrant may mean a drastic difference in the outcome of firefighting efforts. The house you save may be your own.

We urge residents to help prepare for the winter season by shaking their mailbox. If the mailbox moves when shaken, the mailbox and/or post may not withstand standard snow removal operations and should be repaired or replaced prior to the onset of winter. In most cases where mailboxes are damaged, the snow plow does not actually hit the mailbox, rather the force of snow thrown from the roadway knocks down a loose mailbox. Damage to posts and receptacles can often be prevented by proper routine maintenance. *According to the United States Postal Service, mailboxes should be placed with the face of the box 6 to 8 inches from the front of the curb.

Park vehicles off the streets during winter storms to allow for safe and efficient snow removal from curb to curb. Also remove trash cans and sports equipment from the roadway prior. To avoid being plowed in, shovel snow to the right of your driveway (as you are facing the road).

It is unlawful to throw, shovel or plow snow into any roadways within the township from adjoining property. It is unlawful to park any vehicles on a Snow Emergency Route during a declared Snow Emergency. Please consult the Public Works section of the Township website for a list of Snow Emergency Routes.

Tips to Improve Stormwater Quality in the Winter

What is Stormwater?

Stormwater runoff is water from a rain event, or snow that melts and runs across the ground. Stormwater may infiltrate into the ground, runoff into storm sewers and streams, evaporate into the air or be used by plants.

Why is Stormwater a problem?

Stormwater running across lawns, roads, driveways, and parking lots can pick up pollutants such as oil, fertilizers, salt, dirt/sediment and trash and carry these pollutants to the storm sewers and streams.

With more developments, there are more surfaces that do not allow for water to infiltrate, which increases the volume of water flowing into our storm sewers and streams causing more frequent flooding.

The increased flow in streams causes streambank erosion. The erosion eats away at the ground adjacent to the stream and soil is carried away in the stream which damages the natural habitat for fish and other aquatic life.



How can you help? There are many ways a homeowner can help protect our streams.

Here are some ways to help:

* Reduce the amount of mowed grass and plant native trees and shrubs which have larger root systems.

* Reduce impervious areas that prevent the stormwater from infiltrating into the ground.

Use pervious paving systems for walkways and patios.

- * Do not over fertilize.
- * Do not wash grass clippings or pollutants into the storm drain.
- * Install a rain barrel to irrigate your garden.

* Create a rain garden to collect rain water and allow it to infiltrate or be used by the plants.

Community & Land Development Updates



Starbucks is now open. The 2,600 square foot restaurant with drive-thru is located at the corner of Sumneytown Pike and Towamencin Avenue, adjacent to the Courtyard Marriott Hotel.

Franklin Street Storage Facilities – Mequity Companies has begun construction on a 102,720 square foot indoor airconditioned storage facility on Franklin Street between Sumneytown Pike and I-476.

Core5 Warehouse Project – Core5 Industrial Partners has received land development approval for a 591,360 square foot warehouse facility on Wambold Road at Allentown Road. Although the address is Allentown Road, the development is primarily along Wambold Road. Site construction has begun.

TNC Self Storage – TNC Self Storage has received approval to expand the existing self-storage facility on Wambold Road, the expansion will add an additional 40,200 square feet to the 65,333 square foot facility.

Dock Woods Health Care Addition – Dock Woods has received approval for a 17,540 square foot building expansion. The expansion will allow for additional room to convert all double occupancy rooms to single occupancy rooms. The total number of beds will remain the same.

Delp Drive Warehouse Development – Versus Partners, LLC is seeking a land development application for a 267,648 square foot warehouse located at the end of Delp Drive.

Sewer System Valuation Process

As many are aware, the Township is exploring a potential sale of the Township's sanitary sewer system. The Board of Supervisors feels it is their fiduciary responsibility to the residents and rate payers of the Township to evaluate if a sale of the sewer system assets makes sense to the Township financially. They are committed to seeing the process through to the bid phase to see what the system is worth. No decisions have been made to date. As this newsletter is being drafted, the Township is still in the exploration phase of the valuation process with bid documents being drafted, and several steps to follow, including:

- · Continue drafting bid documents, including rounds of revisions
- Public Financial Management (PFM) will review the bid documents with the Board, then seek authorization to release them at a public meeting in November/ December.
- Bids due back in January/February.

We encourage our residents and business owners to stay informed by visiting the sewer system valuation webpage of the Township's website, which can be found at www.towamencin.org/sewersystemvaluation.html.

This webpage includes a frequently asked questions document (FAQ) related to the proposed sale/lease of system and many related documents for the public's consumption. Updates will be added to this webpage. In addition, progress updates are provided monthly at the Board of Supervisors' Monthly Meeting, held the 4th Wednesday of each month. These meetings are public, where you may attend in person or remotely (Zoom).



Towamencin Volunteer Fire Company News



2021 has been fast-moving for our fire company. This year has remained a challenge for Towamencin Volunteer Fire Company (TVFC) with member COVID Vaccinations, COVID restrictions, the number of COVID cases reducing only to see things ramp up again in August. As a 100 percent volunteer fire company serving this community, TVFC has taken the precautions necessary to attempt to protect our members, as well as, the community we serve. As we draft this update in early August, we are once again experiencing approximately 250 calls this calendar year. At this pace, we will exceed 400 alarms for the year again. We have experienced a higher number of multiple company fires this year within the North Penn area which we have served in helping to extinguish with our neighboring fire companies. We also now respond, along with the ambulance, to cardiac arrest calls to assist the ambulance teams.

We have welcomed 11 new members into full TVFC membership status and 2 probationary members. Our newest members are: Bob Bausman, Sam Clemmer, Sam Baruffi, Alex Carpenter, Jake Healey, Joey Irvine, Zachary Vinitski, Fran Ryan. Judah Whitney, and Pete Yourl. We also welcome back member Brian Healey to active status. We also added Aaron Schwenn and Keith Thornton to our membership probationary period. We appreciate them all stepping forward to serve with us.

Keeping membership strong is essential to our ability to provide the quick response when needed. Consider joining this family.

By the time you receive this newsletter, our annual TVFC fund drive for 2021 will be halfway completed. We sincerely thank those that have generously contributed so far. Police Department Recognizes Sgt. Paul's Retirement



The Board of Supervisors presented a commendation for distinguished service to Sergeant Michael Paul, who retired from the police department in early September. Chief Troxel followed up by presenting Sergeant Paul with a retirement badge to commemorate his service. We congratulate Michael on his retirement and wish him the best in his future endeavors.

Michael Paul served on Towamencin Township's Police Department for more than 25 years, starting in February 1996. During his tenure, he served many roles, including: patrol officer, field training officer, a Traffic Safety Unit member, a School Resource Officer / juvenile detective for the Township's Criminal Investigative Division (CID), spending 14 years in CID investigating major crimes. During his Towamencin career, he received over 30 departmental commendations and more than 150 positive correspondence letters from the

community. In April 2017, Michael was promoted to the rank of patrol sergeant and assumed command of a patrol squad. Sergeant Paul completed his career as a distinguished patrol supervisor and the Intelligence Liaison Officer for Towamencin Township.

Sergeant Paul was also a member of the North Penn Area Tactical Response Team (NPTRT) an elite group of specially trained officers tasked with handling high-risk/barricade/ hostage situations - serving as operator and team secretary, from 1997 – 2003.

Towamencin' s L.O.C.A.T.E Program

The Towamencin Township Police Department has implemented the L.O.C.A.T.E. Program aimed to benefit endangered residents and frequent visitors to our Township.

L.O.C.A.T.E. empowers our officers with the tools to respond to the needs of our community. The main concept of this program is to gather information to better serve those in our Township with special needs who may require police services.

Is L.O.C.A.T.E. right for you? You may want to consider participation if your loved one may be unable to provide personal information in an emergency. This program helps officers provide effective police services to endangered residents and frequent visitors to Towamencin who may have decreased cognitive function due to Alzheimer's, Dementia, Autism, or Traumatic Brain Injury.

If you feel this program is right for you, please complete the registration form that can be found on the Police Department's webpage, as well as, the Township's homepage. Once completed, we ask that you submit a photograph of the person you're registering to

59detectives@towamencinpd.org. This information will be entered into our records management system so it is easily accessible to our officers in the event of an emergency.

Participation in this program is 100% voluntary. Information collected is not disseminated outside of law enforcement or other emergency response agencies. You may withdraw your participation in the program at any time for any reason by emailing 59detectives@towamencinpd.org.

How Does it Work?

Information received from registrants will be added into the police records system. In the event of a missing or found persons report, officers will be able to quickly access the information and photographs in our records system allowing for a more effective police response to safely return the individual home.

What Does the Police Department Do With The Information?

Information received is added into our records management system and is used only in the event there is a report for a missing or found person. Information is only disseminated in the event of an emergency. Upon notice that participation in the program is no longer desired, the identifying information is removed from our records system.

The answer was clear. Change.

Of course, change is never easy. Did we hit a few bumps in the road with the changeover? Yes. Was there some pain in the process? Absolutely, but we would like to sincerely thank all our players and their families and our volunteers for their patience and perseverance as we navigated through this major transformation.

As the old saying goes, "from pain comes strength." We are confident that by switching to the LeagueApps system, TYA and its members will be much stronger for it.



Environmental Advisory Council Recaps & Updates

• Earth Day Event - The EAC had beautiful weather for its fourth annual invasive plant removal event on Saturday, April 24th at Fischer's Park. Volunteers assisted trained members of the EAC in identifying and removing garlic mustard in the park, thus protecting native species of plants and animals in their natural habitats. We also noticed an improvement in the areas that we worked on in past years. Thank you to all of the volunteers who helped us!

• eWaste Recycling Day 2021 – Towamencin Township hosted its third electronics recycling day on June 26th with the help of eForce Compliance. The event was held at the North Penn High School for Township residents. The electronic collections totaled 21,393 pounds, surpassing our 2019 collection of 18,786 pounds.

• Perkiomen Watershed Conservancy 2021 Perkiomen Plant-A-Thon Project – The Township Board of Supervisors has approved a project proposed by the Perkiomen Watershed Conservancy for volunteers to plant 100 native trees along a section of the Towamencin Creek. The Perkiomen Plant-A-Thon is a watershed-wide conservation event with the goal of planting over 5,000 native trees, shrubs, and perennials within the Perkiomen watershed. The Towamencin project area is a semiforested field located at the western corner of Kriebel Road and Pheasant Hill Way. Planting native trees in this area will improve the riparian buffer, increase the wildlife habitat, reduce flooding, and reduce the amount of stormwater entering the creek.

According to the Perkiomen Watershed Conservancy's website, the planting will take place on Saturday, October 23rd, from 10 am to 3 pm. The Conservancy will contact you the week of planting with additional information.

Fischer's Park: A Hot Spot for Birdwatching

Did you know that 133 different species of birds have been positively identified at Fischer's Park? This includes exotic warblers, spirited sparrows, regal eagles, majestic owls, colorful finches, noisy blackbirds, industrious woodpeckers, and many other distinctive types of winged visitors. Their presence at the park has delighted careful observers for many years.

Both casual birdwatching and the more serious "birding" have become increasingly popular hobbies. The number of active birders has surged during the pandemic as it affords folks an opportunity to engage with nature

and to be active outside, while social distancing. Even if you cannot get outside, you can observe many birds from the comfort of your home. It's a hobby that doesn't take much to get started - many homes have an unused pair of binoculars just lying around, and there are a number of online resources and field guides to help identify the birds in our area. If you want to get birding, Fischer's Park is a great place to start.

Fischer's Park is a wonderful birding destination, as it supports several bird-friendly habitats. A big attraction is the tree lined Towamencin Creek. Over twenty species of neotropical warblers have been identified at the park, many of them catching and eating bugs from the trees by the creek. Semi-resident Mute Swans seem to raise at least one cygnet every spring into the summer. Mallards, Wood Ducks, mergansers and, of course, Canadian Geese swim the waters

almost year-round. Great Blue Herons, Green Herons, and Belted Kingfishers patrol the stream, and even a couple of sandpipers wade in on occasion. The many "pocket" woods in the park are bountiful areas of feathered discovery. Year-round chickadees, titmice, cardinals, and robins are always fun to watch and listen to. And it's a great day when you can get the "sixpack" of woodpeckers — the Downy, Hairy, Flicker, Red-bellied, Yellowbellied Sapsucker, and the biggest of them all, the Pileated Woodpecker.

The north side of the park, now more accessible thanks to the pedestrian



bridge, offers even more varied habitat, and thus more species. In 2020, after the bridge opened,

several new species were identified for the first time in the meadows and adjacent farmland on the north side. These include: Lincoln's and Whitecrowned Sparrows, Great Horned Owls, American Pipits, American Kestrel, and American Woodcock (a very patriotic flock, indeed!). It's even suspected that a pair of Yellow-billed Cuckoos spent the summer, likely nested and raised a family in the woods adjacent to the old Arneth Farm

field. And, of course, clear views of big blue sky are accessible from all areas of the park where many eagles, hawks, falcons, and other raptors are seen regularly soaring overhead.

Are you getting more excited about birding at Fischer's Park? If so, you should check out the online resource ebird.org. It's a scientific database and tool managed by the Cornell University Lab of Ornithology. A quick search for Fischer's Park among the site's hotspots will reveal all logged sightings. You'll see that Fischer's Park is ranked 34th from over 200 locations in Montgomery County, in order of bird species identified. You can find pictures and sound recordings of many of the birds at the park. You can view bar charts and graphs of when birds show up and when they depart throughout the year. You will see that May is the hottest month for birds (94 species!) and that January is the least active (a still-respectable 41 species). You can even add your own sightings to the database. Once you get started, you're likely to enjoy the challenge of learning and finding new birds, maybe even photo-

graphing, or recording them and adding them to the database.

So, what are you waiting for? Grab a pair of binoculars and head to Fischer's Park. Exercise your legs, while you train your eyes and ears to identify what's flying though the sky. As the sun warms your face, you'll find your worries melt away as you search for a new bird to add to your life list (a birdwatching journal), and maybe you'll even add a new bird species to the Fischer's Park total. Happy birding!




